Sailing Courses in May and July

It's time to start thinking about training again. The adult course this year is the **first three weekends in May**, giving plenty of time to build skill during the rest of the season. If you know somebody that may need to revitalise their New Year's Resolution this is the perfect course. Hurry though, we've already got three names.

Staggeringly good value and possibly one of the highest instructor to student ratios in the country. (I'll just check I got that the right way round.) Yes! Race Nights O.O.D Duties

In the past, one of the boats which regularly competes has been allocated to provide the Officer of the Day (O.O.D.) for this task. This means that a helm or crew member is regularly unable to race, especially if the fleet is small in number ,as has been the case over the last couple of years. I have decided to address this problem in two ways:

- 1)Helm or crew who race on a Monday evening will be asked to be O.O.D. on Wednesday evening,but never on a Monday, and conversely, some of the Wednesday evening dinghy racers would be asked to do duty on a Monday evening rather than Wednesday .
- 2) The pool of potential OOD candidates would be extended to include club members who do not normally race. This has more advantages for the keelboat fleet than the dinghy fleet, but I look forward to any suggestions from the membership.

We were about to enter Loch Creran in Camasunary – the Hunter Liberty which is a 22ft ketch with unstayed masts. Loch Creran is a pleasant spot but the entrance is a bit ‘twisty’ with some nasty rocky bits.

We were, of course, sailing, with crew John – good company but no kind of sailor – having been on board for no more than an hour for the passage from Airds Bay. Just at the tricky bit where we have to bear away to follow the channel we are hit by the most horrible line squall I ever saw.

With the boat up on its ear I managed to let go the sheets (no point in asking the crew who didn’t know what they were). Unfortunately, because of a dodgy fitting which I ought to have replaced the boom swung out too far and the gooseneck broke. So here we were with the boom end flailing about and trailing in the water and the boat in imminent danger of charging up the beach.

Somehow we scraped past and managed to anchor in the Loch where the pulse rate slowly returned to normal and we could collect our wits.....
